A Letter From Our Board President, Roger Aceves



THE NEED: "57% of parents in the U.S. report that they can't enroll their children in afterschool programs because they are too expensive. Another report found that 7.7. million children are alone and unsupervised after school," (Afterschool Alliance)

WHAT WE DO: UBGC offers affordable, quality programming for children to attend after school. Our programs focus on an array of subjects, such as academic assistance, arts, and healthy habits, which encourage each child to grow in a wide variety of subjects.

OUR IMPACT: By providing a safe and welcoming space to learn, UBGC fosters a supportive environment where children create, move, learn, and thrive. Not only does this help our children academically, but it also helps to improve their social-emotional well-being.

THE NEED: 1 in 8 children in California are facing hunger (Feeding America).

WHAT WE DO: UBGC's Zero Hunger Food Program served **65,569** meals and **10,224** snacks to youth members and their families in 2022, all at no cost.

OUR IMPACT: UBGC is working to combat food insecurity in our community through providing hot, nutritive meals to our members after school, as well as during summer and holiday breaks. Each meal served by the UBGC Food Program meets the 5 healthy-meal components, ensuring each child receives the nutrition to learn, play, and grow.

THE NEED: 75% of students report feeling moderately, slightly, or not at all prepared for college" (YouScience)

WHAT WE DO: In Fall 2022 UBGC launched the College and Career Bound (CCB) program, which is designed to prepare our middle and high school members for their future education and career endeavors. The CCB curriculum includes academic support, workshops, visits to various universities, guidance in the financial aid process, and career mentorship.

OUR IMPACT: Through their participation in the CCB program, our members receive individual academic and social-emotional support as they are guided in the college preparation process. This mentorship will allow our CCB members to build a brighter future for themselves as they are given the necessary tools to pursue and achieve their goals of higher education and employment.

Alexander has been a member of the Westside Boys and Girls Club since he was six years old. Now at 16, Alexander has become a leader and inspiration to all club members and staff. As a kid, Alexander would always get into trouble with the staff for issues such as not staying in his rotation and bullying other members. As he got older, there was a change in him. He began to help out around the club. He has shown so much progress in becoming a natural leader for the teens. Alexander has put in more time than any other teen in the club with 350 hours of volunteering and has built long-lasting relationships with staff. He truly illustrates the mission of the Boys & Girls Club.

Donovan is the most accepting person in the entire club. Donovan surrounds himself with positive energy and has wisdom far beyond his years. Donovan is always trying to make someone feel good about him/herself especially if someone is having a bad day. Donovan is quick to stick up for what is right and promotes kindness all around. He taught us how to meditate and it has helped many kids who struggle with fidgeting in their seats. You would not think such positivity would come from a child who was bullied. We could all learn an important lesson from Donovan: treat others the way we would want to be treated!



In 1938 a group of firefighters and community members took an old firehouse and turned it into the first Boys Club in Santa Barbara County. Started with only 10 boys, by the end of the year the Club had over 200 members. If the walls of the Club could talk, they would tell you about the tens of thousands of children whose lives were changed through sports, mentoring, and compassion. 
Blue Door Heroes Monthly Giving Program
